What do we do?

Knighton Community Woodlands Group manages woodlands for the benefit of wildlife and our members. In coming together to share and learn woodland skills, we aim to manage woodland in a sustainable way and to allow our members access to affordable woodland products - such as firewood and timber.



It is a common misconception that unmanaged woodland is best for wildlife. In fact, by managing the woodland through traditional practices such as coppicing, we increase the variety of habitats and increase the richness of wildlife. In ensuring that the trees that we fell for fuel or timber are replaced with new plants, we are creating a sustainable supply of woodland products.

In sustainably growing firewood and other woodland products we can meet some of our fuel and food needs as well as reducing our carbon footprints. At the same time we are joining co-operatively with other local people to enjoy, conserve and enrich our local environment.

1. Volunteer.

Volunteering is a great way to meet like-minded people. You can get plenty of fresh air and exercise and learn new skills. We need help with hands-on woodland management such as tree planting and firewood processing, regular flora and fauna surveys. We also have a wide range of behind-the-scenes volunteering opportunities for those who love woodlands but who, for whatever reason, cannot work in the woods. We are always keen to hear from people with experience of funding bids, marketing & promotion, sales and I.T.

2. Become a Member.

When you become a member you get a say in how the Group is run; you can help decide policies that guide how we operate. You'll also become part of an active community of like-minded people who are working towards sustainable development. And that's not all. You can attend members' meetings, such as our AGM, where you can raise issues that are important to you and find out more about how the Group is doing. Plus, you can vote for someone to represent your views as a Trustee. And if you fancy it, you can even stand for election yourself as a Trustee – it's a great chance to represent your fellow members.

Membership costs just £10 a year.

3. Become a Member Volunteer.

Why not combine volunteering with membership and become a Member Volunteer?

It's a great way to actively support the Group's woodland management activities whilst also having your say in how it is run.

Member Volunteers of the Group can also access the woodland products – such as firewood and timber - generated by our activities.

Weir Cottage Wood

- Private garden in Shropshire Hills AONB
- 0.44 ha. (1.09 acres)
- Broadleaved woodland of mixed age classes
- Ancient semi-natural woodland
- Coppice with scattered older ash, sycamore and wych elm.
- Power line and telephone line present
- 10 year agreement with owner to share produce




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







Larch Plantation


- Part of the Samatha Trust Centre Buddhist retreat
- 1.95ha (4.82 acres) of Japanese Larch planted in the 1950s, at risk of *Phytophora ramorum*
- Under-storey of native species, small chestnut coupe
- Very steep site with no access tracks within it
- 10 Year Woodland Management Licence signed
- 10 year woodland management plan put in place, reviewed annually, to convert site to a native-species broadleaf woodland
- Steep learning curve









Map 2 - Suggested Felling Coupes for the Larch Plantation

Composting Loo















Castle Ring Wood

- Private woodland at Beggar's Bush
- 11.98ha (29.6 acres)
- Conifers clear-felled in 1996 and restocked with native broadleaves particularly hazel
- Restored Ancient Woodland Site (RAWS) former Plantation on an Ancient Woodland Site (PAWS)
- Almost flat site with access tracks within it
- 10 Year Woodland Management Agreement signed
- Woodland management plan is in place
